

KU Master of Arts in Counseling: Addiction Requirements

Paragraph summary of program and program student learning outcomes.

The Department of Counselor Education offers a 60-semester hour Master of Arts in Counseling with a concentration in Addiction Counseling. The program is structured to meet the standards required by CACREP for accreditation. The Addiction Counseling program is currently under review for CACREP accreditation as a "new application in process." The Addiction program consists of core counseling courses, specialty area courses, and 700 hours of field experience. Degree requirements for this program meet the educational requirements for Pennsylvania state licensure as a Professional Counselor (LPC). Graduates of the program are eligible to take the National Counselor Examination (NCE) examination, a state licensure prerequisite, and a prerequisite to become a Nationally Certified Counselor (NCC). Completing the program in Addiction Counseling will meet the educational requirements of the Pennsylvania Certification Board to become a Certified Advanced Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CAADC).

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Students will demonstrate knowledge of the ethical standards in counseling and the advocacy role of counselors in addressing institutional and social barriers which impede access, equity and success for clients
2. Students will demonstrate knowledge of the multicultural competencies and the effects of power and privilege for counselors and clients.
3. Students will demonstrate knowledge about human growth and development across the life span, have an awareness of the complexity of human development, and its impact on development of treatment plans and interventions
4. Students will demonstrate knowledge about ethical and culturally relevant strategies for addressing career development and demonstrate knowledge in career assessment.
5. Students will demonstrate knowledge in essential interviewing, counseling and case conceptualizing skills and will use evidence-based strategies and techniques for prevention and intervention.
6. Students will demonstrate knowledge about the dynamics associated with group process and development and demonstrate knowledge on the ethical and culturally relevant strategies for designing and facilitating groups.
7. Students will demonstrate knowledge in the use of assessments for diagnostic and intervention planning purposes and demonstrate knowledge about ethical and culturally relevant strategies for selecting, administering and interpreting assessment and test results.
8. Students will demonstrate knowledge about the identification of evidence-based counseling practices and the evaluation of counseling interventions and programs.
9. Students will demonstrate knowledge and competency in addiction counseling and ethical decision making and advocacy.

Note that all students must achieve 60 graduate credits and a minimum 3.0 overall GPA to graduate. In addition to credit requirements for the program and consultation with their advisors, students must have completed the following:
