Master of Arts in Counseling: Marriage, Couple, and Family Requirements

The Department of Counselor Education offers a 60-semester hour CACREP accredited Marriage, Couple and Family Counseling program. The program consists of core counseling courses, specialty area courses, and 700 hours of field experience. Students who successfully complete degree requirements for this program meet the educational requirements for Pennsylvania Licensed Professional Counselor. Graduates of the program are eligible to take the National Certified Counselor (NCC) examination, a state licensure prerequisite.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will demonstrate knowledge of the ethical standards in counseling and the advocacy role of counselors in addressing institutional and social barriers which impede access, equity and success for clients
- 2. Students will demonstrate knowledge of the multicultural competencies and the effects of power and privilege for counselors and clients.
- 3. Students will demonstrate knowledge about human growth and development across the life span, have an awareness of the complexity of human development, and its impact on development of treatment plans and interventions
- 4. Students will demonstrate knowledge about ethical and culturally relevant strategies for addressing career development and demonstrate knowledge in career assessment.
- Students will demonstrate knowledge in essential interviewing, counseling and case conceptualizing skilled and will use evidenced-based strategies and techniques for prevention and intervention.
- 6. Students will demonstrate knowledge about the dynamics associated with group process and development and demonstrate knowledge on the ethical and culturally relevant strategies for designing and facilitating groups.
- 7. Students will demonstrate knowledge in the use of assessments for diagnostic and intervention planning purposes and demonstrate knowledge about ethical and culturally relevant strategies for selecting, administering and interpreting assessment and test results.
- 8. Students will demonstrate knowledge about the identification of evidence-based counseling practices and the evaluation of counseling interventions and programs.
- 9. Students will demonstrate knowledge and competency in marriage, couple and family counseling and ethical decision making.

Note that all students must achieve 60 graduate credits. The final GPA requirement for Master of Arts in Counseling: Marriage, Couple, and Family is 3.0. In addition to credit requirement for the program and consultation with their advisors, students must have completed the following:
